That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!" Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread. (Luke 24:33-35)

Traditionally, on the Monday following Easter Sunday, the Gospel reading comes from Luke, chapter 24, the Road to Emmaus story. It begins with two disciples walking from Jerusalem to the town of Emmaus about seven miles away. While walking, they are joined by Jesus, but their eyes are kept from recognizing him. During the ensuing conversation, the disciples speak about Jesus' crucifixion, death, and burial—and the rumors about an empty tomb and angels. Jesus then expounds upon the Scriptural witness. Arriving in Emmaus, the disciples invite Jesus to dinner. He originally declines, but then, reluctantly, joins them. As Jesus breaks the bread, his true identity is revealed; and he disappears from their sight. That's where the above verse begins.

We have just celebrated the Resurrection of Our Lord—Easter. We have waited for Easter for the past six weeks and all our lives. After all, it is through this event that we are given life—now and always. Death has been destroyed, the devil is vanquished, and we are free—saved by grace. What more could we ask. It is the first day of the week, early in the morning, and life has come.

The Emmaus story is a reminder that, while the celebration of Easter Sunday is a wonderful and blessed occasion, we aren't limited to one day each year to celebrate the new life given through the death and resurrection of our Lord. Each Sunday is a day to remember and give thanks for the new life we have received through Jesus. After all, as the Emmaus disciples testified, Jesus is made known in the breaking of the bread.

As the gather around the table each Sunday, Jesus is present with us bringing with him forgiveness and life. When we eat of the bread and drink from the cup, we are proclaiming the promise of new life given through Jesus' death and resurrection. More than just Easter Sunday, or any Sunday for that matter, every time we eat and drink—break bread together at our homes and with our loved ones—we remember and celebrate what Jesus has done for us. We rejoice in the life he offers, the joy he brings, and the hope he gives.

As the disciples gave witness every Easter eve, we give witness each time we break bread together that Jesus is present. That is the gift of Easter that we can celebrate every day.

Alleluia! Christ is Risen! He is Risen, Indeed! Alleluia!

Aebleskiver Breakfast April 21, 2024

About Æbleskiver

Food:

Æbleskiver are spherical Danish snacks made from fried batter. The name literally means "apple slices" in Danish, although apples are not usually an ingredient in present-day versions. The crust is similar in texture to European pancakes, but with a light and fluffy interior similar to a Yorkshire pudding. Wikipedia

Not quite a donut and not quite a popover, an ebelskiver (pronounced "able-skeever") is a light, puffy, filled pancake cooked in a special pan on the stovetop.

The aebleskiver is thought to have originated with the Vikings and used to restore strength after a battle. Whether this is actually true or not, no one knows, but it certainly is a nice tale to tell again. The earliest known aebleskivers have been found in 300 year old pans that were made of copper. The Redemption Project believes that addressing the basic need of employment for inmates upon their release will have a positive impact on breaking the cycle of recidivism. Their three-stage program of **Educate**, **Advocate** and **Support** is designed to meet the needs of inmates throughout their reentry process. In addition, they believe an individual who has the dignity, self-respect, and economic benefits of meaningful employment can help address the other roadblocks related to recidivism which include Addiction Issues, Lack of Education and Lack of Housing.

Dwight will share how The Redemption Project works with inmates to develop an intellectual framework based on the cardinal virtues of Wisdom, Courage, Self-Control, and Justice to prepare them for employment and a successful life after prison. The organization provides mentoring, financial assistance and help in finding employment so their program participants can have a new start in life.


