


"In this season of Advent, we will reflect on our biblical ancestors, waiting for the coming of the Messiah as they, too. Longed for God to be revealed, 'to lift up the lowly and fill the hungry with good things' (Luke 1:52-53). Through reflection on the stories of our biblical past and the stories of ministries responding to hunger and poverty today, we will explore together the many ways "the glory of the Lord" is revealed in communities that have come together to confront deep challenges with strength, hope, and longing for a just world where all are fed." (from *Advent Study 2023*).

Our Mission Statement

We are a fellowship of believers in Christ, sustained by God's Word, led by the Holy Spirit and committed to God's vision of caring.

Our liturgy during Advent is "In Light & Darkness". The inspiration for our theme comes from the common usage of "light" and "darkness" and exploring how the earth experiences both the very lightest and darkest days with summer and winter solstices. Scripture focusing on God's light has led to the belief light is the source of goodness and hope. This belief implies darkness is not wanted or needed, it is something to banish or get rid of, or God is not even present in the dark. Barbara Brown Taylor's book, Learning to Walk in the Dark, helps us reimagine our understanding of darkness, primarily how Christianity heavily relies on the binary construct of light as good and darkness as bad. Taylor proposes that the pair of light and dark co-exist in balance, not opposition. She asks, "What can light possibly mean without dark?" We hope our In Light and Darkness-themed materials will help you share conversations about your understanding of light and darkness. We will explore how those understandings influence how you view God, your faith, and the world.

The *In Light & Darkness Advent Devotional* will be available as a complement to our weekly liturgy. It is a weekly devotional based on scripture showing how light and darkness exist together. The short reflections explore the theme of light and darkness in Advent scriptures. How we understand these ideas affects how we view God, our faith, and our world. Inspired by Barbara Brown Taylor's book, *Learning to Walk in the Dark*, we re-frame traditional understandings of light as good and darkness as bad or evil. Be sure to pick up a devotional at church.

Norris was a guest at a Catholic monastery during the week in 1997 when the members of the "Heaven's Gate" cult all committed suicide based on their strange belief about events connected with the appearance of the Hale-Bopp comet. Norris heard the news in the monastery and noted that the members of that cult had referred to themselves as "monks."

She later wrote that the Heaven's Gate devotees didn't seem much like the monks she knew, for she found the monasteries to be hospitable places, welcoming to guests, whereas the cult did not tolerate outsiders. Norris noted that St. Benedict said, "A monastery is never without guests," and added, "What Benedict says might be seen as a way to define a monastery—if it regularly exercises enough hospitality so as a way to attract guests, it is a monastery. If it doesn't, it is not" (Kathleen Norris, Amazing Grace [New York: Riverhead Books, 1998], 262-263). And a similar definition could be used as part of what it means to be a church. 
Our Mentor Event for December will be Sunday, December 10th at 12:00 noon at Trinity Lutheran in Trinity Hall.
