"Let Go, and Let God"

I've heard that statement many times. I've even told myself to "Let Go, and Let God." To some, the statement might seem so simplistic and cliché. Others will tout that this statement isn't very easy to do. For others, the statement is a motto for life that they cling to with all their faith. I guess I would find myself somewhere in the middle.

In my bedroom, I have a plaque that says, "Give it to God, and Go to Bed." Once again, easier said than done. However, what happens when we do "Let Go, and Let God" or "Give it to God, and Go to Bed?"

First, it allows us to focus on who is ultimately in control. There are things I can control in my life. I can control when I go to bed. I can control what I eat and who I hang out with. There are also things I can't control. I can't control the weather. I can't control the other drivers that might not be paying attention. I can't control other people and what they may or may not do. With this, I can focus on who is in control.

As I've asked before, "Who is in control?" God is. Nothing is impossible with God. Believing in God won't give us lives of riches and luxury. God doesn't promise that. God does promise that he will never leave you when things get rough. God promises that he will always love you, forgive you, and give you his grace. God promises you, through Jesus' death and resurrection, that you will be eternally with God.

Who is in control? We can confidently say—God is! God is ultimately in control of our lives and our futures. In our lives, we love God and love others.

When we say "Let Go, and Let God" or "Give it to God, and Go to Bed," we are proclaiming the second truth. Many times the "stuff" of life keeps us from our relationship with God. When we remove those things that don't really matter, we can get to the truth of our lives—that you and I are beloved children of God. We can live in an intimate relationship with God.

What sort of stuff have you put in your garbage bag this Lent? It could be many things. Those jeans that you thought you would wear again but know in your heart you never will. That lamp that won't turn on but you keep trying. The broken toy. Maybe you symbolically threw away that disagreement you had with a loved one that you can't even remember what it's about? Maybe you've symbolically forgiven yourself for that thing that's so hard to forgive.

When we open our hands to God, when we "let go" of the things that keep us from God, we can have a fuller and richer relationship with God. When our lives and our hearts are less cluttered by stuff and more filled with God's promises, our lives are richer and fuller.

God sent his Son, Jesus, to die on the cross for you and me. Jesus didn't die for all the stuff that clutters our lives. Jesus died for you and for me. Jesus died to free you from your sins. Jesus died to make you free. Jesus died to give you life eternal. In the coming weeks, as we watch Jesus' journey to the cross, know that Jesus does that for you, for me, and for all. On the cross, we give thanks that Jesus "Let Go, and Let God."

With what will you fill your bag? Pick up a large garbage bag at church. For Lent this year, let's not only fast but let's do something. Let's fill our Lent bags with the things we don't need any more. What could we put in the Lent bag? It could be an article of clothing we don't wear any more. It could be a toy that has been long forgotten. I could be a book that's been read or never read. It could be a can of vegetables. It could be many things. Or maybe it will be something that we don't need any more and no one else needs it either (like something broken) that is just taking up space and needs to go away and out of our lives. Or could it be an unhealthy emotion or habit? When Lent is over, hopefully our lives will be less filled with junk and more filled with God's love.

Ash Wednesday: Cross Purposes Sunday Lenten Theme

Ash Wednesday: Cross Examine

In our worship this Lent we recognize and reflect upon God's purposes as we stand at the foot of the cross. On Ash Wednesday we examine ourselves in the light of the cross. Though our sins make us guilty, we are found not guilty, through the death of the innocent Son of god.

Week 1: Cross Out

In this service for Week 1 in Lent we remember that all our sins have been crossed out through the forgiveness that comes only through the atoning sacrifice of the crucified Christ.

Week 2: Cross Road

In this service for Week 2 in Lent we remember that heaven crossed the path of earth on Mount Calvary, becoming a cross road for us that changed the direction of our lives forever.

Week 3: Cross Walk

In this service for Week 3 in Lent we remember that we are called to follow Christ on his cross walk, stepping out into a life of suffering and service in the name of the Lord.

Week 4: Cross Word

In this service for Week 4 in Lent we remember that the promise, the message, the word of the cross, is an all-powerful, and that power is made perfect in weakness.

Week 5: Cross Reference

In this service for Week 4 in Lent we remember that the cross of Christ was referenced long ago by the prophets and refers us now to the future glory we will experience in heaven with him.

In our sanctuaries, we will have a **roughhewn cross.** For the season of Lent, you are invited to tie a prayer cloth to the cross. What does this mean? By the cross there will be strips of cloth. During worship as we sing our hymns or when you come up for Holy Communion or sometime during the week, come to the cross. Say a prayer. And tie your prayer to the cross. Your prayer can be for you, for a loved one, for the world, or anything you want to share with God. All are invited to come to the prayer cross.

We are excited that First Lutheran from Glenville will be joining us and also participating in our Lenten service. We should wear name tags! Soup and dessert makers are also needed for our Lenten Suppers.

Scripture theme for March is "Confession and Forgiveness". This month typically aligns with the season of Lent, in which we are called to repent and spiritually prepare for the celebration of Easter and Christ's resurrection. The Bible says that every human being is in debt to the Lord God. Since God created us as good and righteous people whose purpose it was to glorify Him, He has every right to demand our perfect devotion. But since the first humans decided to disobey their Creator, they became sinful and so did all their descendants. We are all affected by sin; we deny God the honor He is due and we continuously transgress against His commandment to love God above all and other people as ourselves. That leaves us guilty and damages our relationship with the Lord God. The only way to restore the relationship between man and God is to remove the debt completely. We can't buy forgiveness with money or sacrifices, we can't compensate for our sins by leading extra righteous lives. The Lord is aware of our inability to get right with Him, he offers a solution Himself. God the Son was ready to take the burden of sin and guilt upon Himself and to pay the ransom by dying in our place. Jesus' sacrifice was the only possible and ultimate solution to the problem of human sin.



Holy Week

Palm Sunday is one of striking contrasts:

Jesus rides into Jerusalem surrounded by shouts of glory, only to be left alone to die on the cross, abandoned by even his closest friends. Mark's gospel presents Jesus in his complete human vulnerability; agitated, grieved, scared, forsaken. Though we lament Christ's suffering and all human suffering, we also expect God's salvation; in the wine and bread, Jesus promises that his death will mark a new covenant with all people. We enter this holy week thirsty for the completion of God's astonishing work.

Palm Sunday Breakfast at Trinity after worship.

Maundy Thursday, March 28, at 5:30 at First Lutheran, Glenville. This evening our Lenten observance comes to an end, and we gather with Christians around the world to celebrate the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection. Tonight we remember Christ's last meal with his disciples, but the central focus is his commandment that we live out the promise embodied in this meal. As Jesus washed his disciples feet, so we are called to give and receive love in humble service to one another. Formed into a new body in Christ through this holy meal, we are transformed by the mercy we have received and carry it into the world. Departing worship in solemn silence, we anticipate the coming days.

Maundy Thursday Meal at First Lutheran, Glenville after worship

Good Friday, March 29 at 5:30 at Trinity Lutherans, Albert Lea. Life and death stand side by side as we enter into Good Friday. In John's passion account, Jesus reveals the power and glory of God, even as he is put on trial and sentenced to death. Standing with the disciples at the foot of the cross, we pray for the whole world in the ancient bidding prayer, as Christ's death offers life to all.

We gather in solemn devotion, but always with the promise that the tree around which we assemble is indeed a tree of life. We depart silently, and we anticipate Easter.

Our Confirmation Students and their Mentors will present the Passion Story.

About Æbleskiver

Food:

Æbleskiver are spherical Danish snacks made from fried batter. The name literally means "apple slices" in Danish, although apples are not usually an ingredient in present-day versions. The crust is similar in texture to European pancakes, but with a light and fluffy interior similar to a Yorkshire pudding. Wikipedia

Not quite a donut and not quite a popover, an ebelskiver (pronounced "able-skeever") is a light, puffy, filled pancake cooked in a special pan on the stovetop.

The aebleskiver is thought to have originated with the Vikings and used to restore strength after a battle. Whether this is actually true or not, no one knows, but it certainly is a nice tale to tell again. The earliest known aebleskivers have been found in 300 year old pans that were made of copper. 
JOURNEY
